¹¹Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him. (John 2:11)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Jesus performed his first miracle—turning water to wine at a wedding—for his mom.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Tell of a time you were challenged to act before you were ready. Did you act anyway? How did it go?

For the littles: Do you think Jesus had fun at his friend's wedding? Did he dance? Did he laugh?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God bless all your milestones. Amen.

Read: Read the key verses from Sunday's reading.

¹⁴In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. ¹⁵Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. (John 2:14-15)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Jesus was angry when he saw what was going on in the temple. Sometimes anger is the right thing.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

What questionable behaviors or customs does your community practice that are so embedded in your community, they have not been examined for a long time? How could you begin to effect change?

What do you think happened after Jesus' fit of anger? Did people change? Why or why not?

For the littles: Do you like to spend money or save it?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God shake up your status quo. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Clean your house. Get rid of things that are bogging you down. Lighten your load. Simplify.

A Jewish leader seeks Jesus under cover of night to ask him the questions which plague his mind, safe from the criticism of his colleagues. What he gets is an education in keeping things hidden.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

In baptism, we die to the old self to be born anew. What needs to die within you so that God can create new life there?

What would you ask Jesus if you could meet him in the middle of the night?

For the littles: Are you afraid of the dark?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God give you new life. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Go swimming. It's January, so you will have to find an indoor pool. Try a local Y or a nearby hotel. As you swim out of season, consider Jesus' blessings given in baptism.

Research a food manufacturer or farm near you. Take a field trip to the location and learn what you can about how food is grown, cultivated, and processed for consumption. Consider how knowing where your food comes from shapes your food choices.

What was Jesus asking people to do when he said, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me"? What comes out of you that contributes positively to the world?

For the littles: What is your favorite thing to drink?

The Pharisees couldn't understand how a sinner that works on the sabbath could also perform miracles like healing a man born blind. They would have to wrestle with this inconsistency of thought.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

How does Jesus reveal himself to you? Do you feel Jesus most close by when things are going well or when they are not?

For the littles: What's something new you have learned this week?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God reveal Jesus to you daily. Amen.

⁴³When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go." (John 11:43-44)



Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

When his friend Lazarus died, Jesus wept. He felt the loss deeply.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

What inside of you needs to die and be resurrected? What needs Jesus' attention in your life? What did people think when they saw Lazarus alive? What would you have done?

For the littles: Is there anything Jesus can't do?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God raise you to new life. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Visit a funeral home. Talk with the director there. Learn what their job is like. How do they stay positive in the midst of so much loss? How do they care for themselves and others? What have they learned from being around so much death and grief?

Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

How have you fallen into a role within your household or work environment? Was your role intentional or did you fall into it unintentionally? Is your role working for you, or could it stand a change?

What does it feel like to have someone wash your feet? Is it an intimate experience? Do you feel vulnerable?

For the littles: Do you like having your feet washed?

May God reverse your role. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Wash someone's feet. Notice how intimate and vulnerable it can be to wash and be washed.

Peter's courage sent him into the courtyard to witness the events of Jesus' arrest and conviction. Peter's fear made him deny knowing his Lord and friend.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

What lies are being told that are so subtle that our culture accepts them as truth? How might you uncover some of those lies for yourself? How might you change your mind about what you believe?

How did Peter feel when he realized what he had done? How would you feel?

For the littles: Who or what reminds you to do the things you're supposed to do?

May God walk with you, even in your darkest moments. Amen.

Make a list of people you avoid because you owe them an apology. Pick one person on the list and ask for their forgiveness.

Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Jesus could turn a word when he met with Pilate during his trial. He knew where the conversation had to lead—to his death.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Tell of a time you weren't sure what you were hearing was the truth or lies. How did you discern the truth?

Did Pilate believe Jesus was a king? Do you?

For the little: How do you know when someone is telling the truth?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God speak truth to you. Amen.

Make a list of your top 5 values. Think of someone whose values differ from yours. Make a list of their top 5 values, to the best of your ability. How do your values shape what you perceive as truth?

They cried out, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!" Pilate asked them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but the emperor. ¹⁶Then he handed him over to them to be crucified. (John 19:15-16)

Reflect: Reflect on the scripture summary.

Pilate was judge and jury in the highest profile case ever tried. The consequence of his decision would last forever.



Connect: Connect in conversation with others in your household.

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Tell of a time you were in a crowd when tension started to build. What is it that makes certain behaviors unacceptable when alone or in small groups, but more acceptable in large crowds? Did you keep your head when the crowd started to turn, or did you follow the crowd?

For the littles: How does it feel when someone lets you down?



Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God guide your thoughts and actions. Amen.



Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Attend a protest and stand up for something you believe in. Keep your head, even if the crowd begins to turn.
