The Three Days (Triduum)

The Three Days is the church's annual experience of the heart of the Christian faith. Because there ought to be no immersion into suffering without the gift of resurrection, and there ought to be no resurrection without the reality of uncertainty and suffering, the Three Days is one story and one worship, told in three chapters: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. Maundy Thursday and Good Friday end in silence, in anticipation of the next chapter in the story.

Maundy Thursday: The First Chapter

The season of turning toward and returning to grace ends as it began: in repentance. Our confession of sin we share is met by the flood of God's forgiveness; even all our self-examination, fasting and prayer, sacrificial giving and works of love are washed away. Grace alone carries us, reconciled with God and with one another, into the Three Days. Now begins "the hour" that holds the universe and widens to eternity: the suffering, death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Psalm 33:13-22

The Lord looks down from heaven; he sees all humankind. From where he sits enthroned he watches all the inhabitants of the earthhe who fashions the hearts of them all, and observes all their deeds. A king is not saved by his great army; a warrior is not delivered by his great strength. The war horse is a vain hope for victory, and by its great might it cannot save. Truly the eye of the Lord is on those who fear him, on those who hope in his steadfast love, to deliver their soul from death, and to keep them alive in famine. Our soul waits for the Lord: he is our help and shield. Our heart is glad in him, because we trust in his holy name. Let your steadfast love, O Lord, be upon us, even as we hope in you.

*Gospel

Luke 22:1-27

P The gospel according to St. Luke, the twenty-second chapter.

C Glory to you, O Lord.

Now the festival of Unleavened Bread, which is called the Passover, was near. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to put Jesus to death, for they were afraid of the people.

Then Satan entered into Judas called Iscariot, who was one of the twelve; he went away and conferred with the chief priests and officers of the temple police about how he might betray him to them. They were greatly pleased and agreed to give him money. So he consented and began to look for an opportunity to betray him to them when no crowd was present.

Then came the day of Unleavened Bread, on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. So Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and prepare the Passover meal for us that we may eat it." They asked him, "Where do you want us to make preparations for it?" "Listen," he said to them, "when you have entered the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him into the house he enters and say to the owner of the house, 'The teacher asks you, "Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large room upstairs, already furnished. Make preparations for us there." So they went and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal.

When the hour came, he took his place at the table, and the apostles with him. He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer; for I tell you, I will not eat it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he said, "Take this and divide it among yourselves; for I tell you that from now on I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. But see, the one who betrays me is with me, and his hand is on the table. For the Son of Man is going as it has been determined, but woe to that one by whom he is betrayed!" Then they began to ask one another which one of them it could be who would do this.

A dispute also arose among them as to which one of them was to be regarded as the greatest. But he said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather the greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves.

Reading of Psalm 22 and Stripping of the Worship Space

As the worship space is stripped, we move with Christ from the celebration of the sacrament toward his arrest and trial, crucifixion, and death. The altar, bare of all adornments, reminds us of Christ in the hands of his captors, stripped of power and glory. The psalm yields to a silent conclusion. The liturgy does not end here but merely pauses, continuing the next evening with Good Friday. Because one fasts when Christ is away, we will not celebrate the sacrament again until the resurrection of our Lord.
